Trip Reports

Mataia Homestead - Glorit April 14 Leader Sheena McGregor

Shortly after our arrival at the Mataia Homestead, Glorit, we were given a warm welcome by one of the owners. who took us to a lovely cottage and gave us a run down on the property. We were handed colour A3 maps of the farm and an information pamplet of the two walks the farm offers.

What a delightful walk this was. We walked approximately 16 kilometres, all of it mown. There were yellow and orange markers (yellow for out and orange for coming back) and some named tracks. There was the occasional side track leading to the water or a lookout point. Of the 1600 hectares 400 hectares has been handed over to the QE Trust. This was the first area in the North Island that Brown Kiwi were released into, this taking place in 2012. This block has been and still is extensively trapped for predators. Xavier, John and Lynne's grandson, was noted for his voracious appetite and skipping ahead of the group like a young pup. At our frequent stops all eyes were trained on the Gibbs Farm and my binoculars were in high demand. We could see new developments happening so another trip could be planned in a year or two to see what eventuates.

Easter Weekend Ohope and Ureweras Leader Lynne Flood

There were ten of us, myself, John, Dave and Heather, Jim D. Jill D. Louis S, Eleanor, Colin and Bronwyn. We left Auckland as planned at 6.00am on Easter Friday and had an easy trip down to the Ohope Bach, stopping off at Ngatea for a yummy breakfast at Glory Café. We arrived at Ohope at about 11.30am and put up tents on the lawn. Colin, Bronwyn and Dave arrived early afternoon. We had a walk on the beach in glorious sunshine, stopped to talk to the fishermen and saw mullet in the water. That night we walked up to the Ohope Store for dinner and this was good food and reasonably priced. That night Colin got a video going and we watched Dave Allen. Next day we set off by 8.30am for our tramp in the Ureweras, meeting my brother, Peter Askey, and two of his tramping club members on the way. We started off from Ogilvie Bridge at Tauwhare and sidled gently along and up to the top of the ridge. From there the track goes down to the stream but we turned off on the right and kept climbing up the ridge following a bait route through virgin bush which has had extensive predator control for many years. The bird life was awesome with all sorts of bird song that we don't usually hear. We saw and heard the Kokako, also Kakariki and lots of Tui. There were many huge Rimu, Tawa, Rata, Miro and Beech trees. We headed for a hut for lunch and sat outside in the sun, watching the birds in the fuschia tree. From there it was straight downhill and knees grumbled. We had a 20 minute walk back along the road, arriving at the cars at 3.00 and back to Ohope by 4.00. The first night at dinner, we had watched Heather slowly demolish a plate of Moroccan chicken and, on the strength of her obvious enjoyment, most of us ordered that the second night and it was easily the nicest meal out I have had. On Sunday we left about 8.30am for a walk from the West End of Ohope Beach. We went over a well worn track to Otawairere Bay. We discovered that this track is part of a 5-7 hour loop (next time?) Again, the weather was gorgeous and we relaxed on this beautiful beach, something akin to paradise, not wanting to ever leave but we had tents to take down so eventually we made it back to the bach and back to reality.
